

## Child Safe Reporting Policy

Title	Content
Introduction [Describe the intent of the policy and who it is for]	The Race Pace Child Safe Reporting Policy is in place to provide a safe and inclusive environment for all children, and applies to all persons attending Race Pace schools including coaches, club members, medical personnel, parents, carers, adults and children  To help keep children safe, we must create, maintain and improve our child safe reporting practices to ensure they remain effective.  Everyone at Race Pace must:  • Know what to report, who to report it to and how to report it  • Report any concerns about the safety or welfare of a child or young person immediately  • Feel confident that concerns and allegations will be dealt with honestly and fairly  • Feel confident in reporting unacceptable behaviour around children and young people
	<ul> <li>Ensure the safety and wellbeing of the child is paramount when an allegation is made</li> </ul>

Title	Content
Definitions of harm and abuse	Besides these types of abuse
	Physical abuse
	<ul> <li>Includes physical punishment such as pushing, shoving, punching, slapping and kicking, resulting in injury, burns, choking or bruising</li> </ul>
	Verbal abuse
	Sexual abuse
	<ul> <li>Includes the sexual touching of a child, grooming, and production, distribution or possession of child abuse material (often known as photography).</li> </ul>
	Grooming
	<ul> <li>The process where a person manipulates a child or group of children, and sometimes those looking after them, including parents, carers, teachers and leaders. They do this to establish a position of trust so they can then later sexually abuse the child</li> </ul>
	Psychological or emotional abuse
	<ul> <li>Includes bullying, threatening and abusive language, intimidation, shaming and name calling, ignoring and isolating a child, and exposure to domestic and family violence</li> </ul>
	Any type of discrimination
	Misconduct
	Inappropriate behaviour that may not be as severe as abuse, although could indicate that abuse is occurring and would often be in breach of Race Pace Child Safe Code of Conduct, including showing a child something inappropriate on a phone, having inappropriate conversations with a child or an adult sitting with a child on their lap.
	Lack of appropriate care
	<ul> <li>Includes not providing adequate and proper supervision, nourishment, clothing, shelter, education or medical care.</li> </ul>
	These types of behaviour are also concerning and should be reported:
	• Flirting
	Sexual innuendo
	Inappropriate text messaging
	Inappropriate photography

- Inappropriate photography
- Exposure to pornography or nudity
- descriptions of sexual acts without a legitimate reason to provide the descriptions
- Sexual comments, conversations or communications
- Comments to a child that express a desire to act in a sexual manner towards the child, or another child
- Ill-treatment of a child
- Neglect of a child
- An assault against a child

Types of complaints	All persons attending Race Pace schools including coaches, club members, medical personnel, parents, carers, adults and children can raise a complaint or concern regarding alleged child abuse as aforementioned. All complaints or concerns should be reported to the Race Pace head coach or other coaches
	All complaints should be reported. This includes:
	Criminal conduct
	Risk of significant harm (ROSH)
	Disclosures of abuse
	<ul> <li>Unacceptable behaviour around children and young people that breaches our Child Safe Code of Conduct</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Suspicion of harm or abuse to a child or young person</li> </ul>
	Reportable conduct
	Reports can be made in face to face in conversation or in writing, via email <a href="mailto:info@racepace.com.au">info@racepace.com.au</a> or by phone 0410467776 or via Facebook or Instagram messaging
Making a complaint	Everyone at Race Pace including coaches, club members, medical personnel, parents, carers, adults and children has the right to make a genuine complaint and won't be punished if they do. Reporting abuse is mandatory and encouraged
	The head coach can write or receive reports of child safe concerns, complaints or allegations from coaches, children and parents
	Coaches can report child safe concerns to the head coach including complaints from children and parents
	Parents / carers and children can report child safe concerns including complaints to the head coach
	Children can report their concerns to their parents / carers or Race Pace head coach or coaches

Reporting obligations	Any persons making complaints or concerns should inform the Race Pace head coach or other coaches. Children can inform parents / carers who can in turn notify Race Pace
	Reporting criminal conduct
	<ul> <li>Contact NSW Police on 131 444 for anything you consider could be a criminal offence. This includes sexual assault, physical assault, grooming offences, and producing, disseminating or possessing child abuse material</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Note: It is a criminal offence for adults not to report to police if they know or believe that a child abuse offence has been committed. In addition, people employed in child-related work may be subject to a criminal offence if they fail to reduce or remove the risk of a child becoming a victim of child abuse</li> </ul>
	Reporting risk of significant harm
	<ul> <li>Any person who has reasonable grounds to believe that a child or young person is at risk of significant harm (ROSH) can report to the Department of Communities and Justice (DCJ) on 132 111 (this is a 24-hour service)</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Mandatory reporters must report to the ChildStory Reporter Community if they have reasonable grounds to suspect a child is at ROSH. For more info go to https://reporter.childstory.nsw.gov.au/</li> </ul>
	Reporting allegations and convictions
	<ul> <li>Relevant entities must notify the Office of the Children's Guardian of reportable allegations or convictions (that is, reportable conduct). This includes sexual offences, sexual misconduct, ill-treatment of a child, neglect of a child, an assault against a child, failure to protect a child or failure to report if a child has been harmed, as well as any behaviour that causes significant psychological harm to a child</li> </ul>
	Reporting breaches of our Child Safe Code of Conduct
	All complaints must be reported to our child safe contact officers.
Risk management	To ensure the immediate and ongoing safety of the child:
strategies	<ul> <li>Establish the welfare and safety of the child and take steps to ensure the child is removed from the risk</li> </ul>
	Reassure them and remain calm
	Listen carefully without interrupting
	<ul> <li>Don't ask leading questions or any additional questions once you've established there is a genuine concern (to not compromise future investigations by NSW Police or DCJ)</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Support them, reassuring the child that they have done the right thing, that you believe them and that the abuse is not their fault</li> </ul>
	Explain what will happen, including timeframes
	Don't make promises you can't keep
	Don't confront the alleged perpetrator
	Seek guidance if you are unsure about what to do.
	It is the child safety officer's role to conduct a risk assessment after receiving an allegation, to ensure the safety of all people involved and maintain the integrity of the investigation

Title	Content
Procedural fairness, including privacy and confidentiality	Any allegation of abuse will be treated in a fair, transparent and timely manner. Coaches subject to an allegation will be notified when a disciplinary hearing will take place and what will occur at the hearing. We follow the obligations defined under the Privacy Act 1988 (Commonwealth), and relevant reportable conduct investigations are conducted with the OCG's Reportable Conduct Directorate.
	Additionally:
	<ul> <li>All information is recorded on our reporting form for complaints and allegations</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>All reporting forms for complaints and allegations are stored securely and only accessed by those in the organisation with responsibility for oversight of the investigation</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Information may be exchanged under Chapter 16A of the Child and Young Persons (Care and Protection) Act 1998, with other agencies who have responsibilities relating to the safety, welfare or wellbeing of children or young people</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Race Pace maintains the privacy of those involved in accordance with our obligations under the Privacy and Personal Information Protection Act 1998</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>if an incident is found to be substantiated, likely outcomes or responses will be determined by Race Pace or from advice given by relevant authorities (police, DCJ or OCG)</li> </ul>
Complaint process	Once a complaint has been made, use this step-by-step process to make sure it's appropriately followed up:
	Steps taken to remove child from harm
	Incident recorded
	Reporting obligations met, if necessary
	<ul> <li>Investigation conducted, keeping everyone involved up to date with what's happening</li> </ul>
	Offering ongoing support to the child as needed
	<ul> <li>Reviewing the incident and updating the organisation's child safe policies, if necessary</li> </ul>
