Nature of services provided	Race Pace schools provide Motocross and Supercross schools as well as one-on-one and small group training				
	Race Pace schools are 1 or 2 days in length (approximately 5 hours), suitable for riders of all ages and skill levels.				
	One-on-one and small group training sessions are 1 – 2 hours in length				
	Course content covers basic riding skills for beginner riders, and advanced techniques for the more skilled racer, but our main focus is on the individual needs of each and every rider. The training consists of exercises including body positioning (i.e. position on the motorcycle), use of controls (i.e. braking, clutch control, throttle control), and more advance techniques such as line selection, passing manoeuvres, race starts and race simulations.
